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Provost Sarah Dunn

An Extraordinary, Ordinary Woman

If anyone has ever visited the Council Chambers in Maybole Town Hall, they will have seen the very impressive, framed photographs of former Provosts. This was from a time when Maybole governed itself, until a change in the law in the 1970s. Amongst the faces of the male Provosts, there is one, cheery female face. This is Provost Sarah Dunn. Sarah was also known as Sally, Sal and Sadie and I will switch between these when telling her story...


In the 1950s, a serious controversy in Maybole occurred that was later called 'The Brown Affair'. This was where the Burgh surveyor was found to be using council workers, on council time, with council materials, to construct driveways on the sly and receive backhanders. This enraged Sally Dunn and her successful campaign against such council deceit, led to her being asked to stand as a Conservative Candidate for Maybole Council which she won (topping the poll!). It should be said, this author has it on good authority that she was Conservative with a small 'c'.

In 1956, Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip visited Maybole as part of their tour of Scotland. Our Sal was ecstatic to be part of the Maybole delegation who got to



welcome Her Majesty. On meeting the Queen, Sally proudly told her that she followed in her father's footsteps on the council as he was the Baillie. Her Majesty replied with "Oh really? How Interesting". Possibly the standard reply from Her Majesty but Sal was thrilled, nonetheless. She even kept the pen that The Queen used to sign the Town Hall Visitor Book.

Sarah and her family received a puppy on the day



that President Eisenhower was inaugurated and was christened 'lke'. Ike it turns out, was a well-known pooch in Maybole and was always keen to potter about the town, visiting shop owners for treats and helping to carry shopping for people. One day, a rather inebriated fellow gave lke his fish supper to carry and it was never seen again!

Incidentally, Ike was in fact a son of Gun Dogs of King George VI and was taken to Culzean during one of Eisenhower's visits to meet his namesake!

Sarah Dunn was of course unanimously elected Provost of Maybole in 1960. Despite working hard in The Dairy Cafe (a very popular cafe at the time where queues were right down the street for Tattie Scones!) money was tight. To ensure she always looked her best, she took up Millenary and made her own hats. As a justice of the peace, a man was brought before her for a crime who exclaimed "I didnae ken it was against the law!" our Sal replied "Aye, weel ye ken noo" and promptly fined him.

When her mother died and her son left for university. Sarah decided she wanted to do more, and so completed a course at Newbattle Abbey and became a teacher. She taught for several years at Pinmore Primary, and this was a career that she loved.

When her Son, David settled with his wife Lorna in Lusaka, Sarah went out to visit for a 3-week holiday and decided she liked it so much, and so she emigrated. Here, she gained her driving license and was engaged as a legal secretary first in Lusaka and later Salisbury (now Harare, in Zimbabwe). A fearless driver, she once encountered a ditch stretching across the road and



despite the shock, exclaimed "No time to Brake!" and instead floored the accelerator and sailed over the gap. It was here that she married an ex-serviceman, Lionel Knight and she only returned to Scotland after his death. Sal's tears as the plane left Durban showed how much she had loved life in Africa.

In her later years, Sarah Dunn lived at Hillcrest in Girvan where she became part of the resident's committee and was linked into local politics once again.

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community Wellbeing Hub 2025 projects off to a flying start

We announced the good news in the last issue that we had been successful in funding another year of holistic therapies for adults with long term conditions in the Carrick area, as well as new National Lottery funding for our work with teens. Both projects are now fully up and running and we have been able to take on a number of new Hub clients, as well as running group and one-to-one sessions for the young people in our communities struggling with their wellbeing. This work is so important as we are playing a vital role in catching both of these age groups 'upstream', before they reach crisis point. With NHS services struggling to manage the demand, we are proud to be able to plug some of the gaps and help more people reach their full potential. We have had a great response from our new teen clients, and are working closely with local secondary schools, community organisations and charities to bring the sessions to as many young people as we can over the course of 2025.



Our Friday morning wellbeing group goes from strength to strength with close friendships being formed and peer support in high supply. We have teamed up with the Info & Advice Hub to bring an advisor in every 6 weeks to support everyone with advice on benefits and services. With a large number of our clients being unpaid carers, this has been a vital link for them and we are grateful to the Info and Advice Hub for bringing their support to our service. We also had a lovely morning hearing about the work of Dementia Befriending Ayrshire - and one of our attendees was inspired to sign up to train and volunteer with them. Spring Highlights

Big ideas, local action here's what's new across our area!



Bruce Trail & AR App

Local schools will be getting involved in a series of creative events linked to the Bruce Trail and its new artworks and augmented reality app. The new Development Trust is working on securing funding to keep the Trail in the public eye!

Carraig Connections & Reading Room

The HEV project is now in its final year. Plans are underway to renovate the Kirkoswald Reading Room into a vibrant community space. A new Trust, "Carraig Connections", is being registered, and drawings and technical details are being prepared to move things forward to Building Warrant stage.

Lion of Carrick

The idea of creating a nationally significant monument to Robert the Bruce is being taken up by the new Development Trust. A Lion of Carrick sculpture may be possible and a site near Turnberry has been proposed. The land owner has been consulted and seems to support the idea and has made helpful suggestions for the site.

A pre-application has been submitted to the Planning Authority. Decisions about how to move the project forward will be made taking account of the response from the Planners.

Maybole Memorial Park Plans

There are ongoing discussions with South Ayrshire Council about how NCCBC (and Carraig Connections) can help drive improvements at the golf course and wider Memorial Park when the current swimming pool closes.

Minishant Eco-Park Project

The Minishant Social and Leisure Group has rebranded to better reflect its work. With support from NCCBC, they're developing plans for an eco-park and new community/environment centre in the woodlands around the football pitch.

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



Growing Roots and Memories at Balbeg Estate

Pupils from Straiton Primary School recently rolled up their sleeves, pulled on their wellies, and got well and truly stuck in, literally, to plant a very special collection of Rowan trees at Balbeg Estate.

Across two visits, in March 2022 and again in December 2024, the children planted fifty trees as part of an ongoing commitment by the team at Balbeg to support biodiversity, outdoor learning, and community engagement. The tree planting was partly funded by the Galloway and South Ayrshire Biosphere and the Ayrshire Tree Planting Programme. It was a joyful and energetic effort, full of muddy



boots, laughter, and proud smiles. The children worked hard with their teachers and helpers, leaving behind something truly meaningful that they can return to in years to come and see flourish.

The project reflects Balbeg Estate's long-standing belief in the power of connecting people with nature. The newly planted trees will become part of the visitor experience, offering a living reminder of how local partnerships can shape the land in a positive way. For families staying at Balbeg, it's a chance to get close to nature and enjoy the simple pleasures of countryside life, something many return to year after year.

We're incredibly grateful to the children and staff who gave their time and energy to make this tree planting project so special. The trees will grow on, but so too will the stories, the memories, and the roots of a shared commitment to community and care for the environment.

MAYBOLE ACTIVE TRAVEL -High Street Public Realm Design

You may be aware of the recent street trial in Maybole High Street, carried out during February and March of this year. This was to support an application to ATIF (Active Travel Investment Fund). Unfortunately, the application for funding was unsuccessful on this occasion.

We are aware that concerns were raised with the design that was trialled in February and March. This combined with the unsuccessful application for funding leaves us with two options:

- 1. We do not apply for further funding and leave the High Street as it is, OR
- 2. We do apply for further funding in January 2026, based on a different design. This will require community input to ensure the new design is more aligned to what the community of Maybole want to see on their High Street.

KA19 7BZ, during the week of 16/06/25 where there will be a comments box for any member of the community to leave their feedback. You can also take the opportunity to learn more about the scheme and chat about your views.

Thereafter, the comments box will be in Maybole Library until 27/06/25. Alternatively, you can email enquiries@ayrshireroadsalliance.org using the subject header "Maybole Active Travel". Please email views by 30/06/25.

Ayrshire Roads Alliance will collate all of the feedback and share an overview of the comments which will then help to inform the initial stages of their redesign.

The Kings Foundation Decor

Within The Gatherings, some of the fixtures and fittings were created by students as part of the Kings Foundation in Dumfries House. The wooden 'counter' incorporates woven textile as a nod to Maybole's weaving past and the lead work of the front windows contain a thread motif as a reminder that the shop was once a haberdashery.

The tiles in the windows feature butterflies and plants that are found locally, and the bespoke handmade wallpaper frieze tells the story of Maybole High Street.

Together, these fantastic decorative touches make The Gatherings a stunning venue for any purpose.

What's been on in The Gatherings so far

As well as being used as a traditional charity shop for several local groups to fundraise, The Gatherings has been used for a number of other purposes.

Carrick History Society have used the shop as a pop-up exhibition and museum space. They also had the shop as an 'Art and Vintage' shop to raise funds. Both events were very successful.

Maybole Regeneration had the shop as an Exhibition space to showcase the result of the weaving project. The weaving project is now on permanent display in Maybole Library.

A local shop owner used The Gatherings before they opened their own shop on the High Street.

Carraig Connections, a new development trust in Carrick, used the shop as a pop-up information centre for people interested in their upcoming projects.

In the future, the shop is being used as a consultation space, fundraising spaces and meeting spaces.

Carrick History Society's FIRST CONFERENCE

On the 12 April, Carrick History Society held their first conference on the subject of 'Carrick's Women in History.

The day was kindly guest chaired by Professor Elaine McFarland, Emeritus History Professor and Chair of Ayrshire Federation of Historical Societies. The first speaker was Sara Sheridan, author of 'Where are the women?' a reimagined history of Scotland where all memorials and statues of men were swapped for women. Sara's talk also highlighted the fact that there are more statues of animals than women in Edinburgh.

Then, there was the first of two playlets where two women were brought together from different time periods. In this case, Lady Evelyn Ailsa met Sarah Dunn, first and only female Provost of Maybole. Hilarity ensued as the two women discussed their different lives and settled down

The next speaker was James Brown who conducted three 'Lightning Talks' about different women in Carrick including: Egidia Blair, Mary Osburn, Robina Kennedy and Agnes Broun.

Dr. Lauren Beatty was next and spoke about the history of women's golf and included some examples of stories from our area, particularly Turnberry Golf Course. Lauren demonstrated how her research included oral histories of women and their experiences.

Jayne Baldwin, author of 'West over the waves', then spoke of the story of Elsie Mackay, pioneering aviator from Glenapp in Ballantrae. Elsie's story is extremely interesting, and she is one woman in particular who deserves to be remembered.

Next, was the second playlet of the day. This time, Elsie Mackay met Robert Burns. Of course, Burns was entranced by Elsie's beauty but she had no time for his nonsense! In the end, Elsie and Burns realised that they had been brought together to learn from each other.





Last but not least, Julia Macdonald from Stranraer and District History Trust spoke on the subject of the Suffragette movement. A very important topic with several connections to places all across Carrick.

During the breaks, guests had the opportunity to view displays and objects related to women's history in Carrick. These included display boards one of which was on the subject of Provost Sarah Dunn and her extraordinary life. The other display board was about Jane McCulloch, one of the first women to enter the Fire Service in Carrick. There was also a display on objects women would use around the home, cookery books and two Baille Robes that were kindly on loan from South Ayrshire Council.

Chair, Simon Glendenning said -

'Our first conference was a total success. It was great to hear all the different kinds of topics that our women are normally left out of. I hope this has raised awareness on a demographic that is continually missed out in celebrations of local history. I know I've certainly got a list of projects that have come out of this! My thanks to my colleagues in Carrick History Society and everyone who attended.'



Looking forward to welcoming you at the group.




Straiton News

path turns to a river of mud, a footbridge is strangely slanted with slippery moss, a cleft in the hillside is hemmed in by wet walls and downed trees that need




scrambling over. It's not a cute place for a bad knee. But above the maze of nature, on the windy grassy top, the world opens out.

peek through the thick wood get you a better bearing. Towards a stand of birch and spruce.



About Us

Carraig Connections is a new Development Trust, created and led by the people of Carrick, South Ayrshire. Formed in December 2024, Carraig Connections looks towards becoming a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) by Summer 2025.

Carraig Connections aims to develop the economy, quality of life, and wellbeing of our community over time by focussing on elements including capital assets, a series of priority projects, cross community infrastructure and capacity building and training. Our work has started, in line with funding, in North Carrick with a view to widening out to the wider Carrick region.

Why Carraig Connections?

In choosing the name, it was agreed that although we work within 'Carrick' there are several organisations in the area that have this word in their name. 'Carraig' is the Gaelic form of the word which means 'rock' and is related to the name of Ailsa Craig. Not only does this choice nod to Carrick's Heritage, but it also allows us to be unique. The 'Connections' part is because we are all about connecting services, people and places into a network.

Who are we?

Our Development Coordinator is Simon Glendenning who is currently working to implement various projects that will help to meet the Development Trust's aims. There are currently three Trustees on the board who will be initially working to establish the Trust as a SCIO and there will be voluntary opportunities for more Trustees in the future. Simon is currently going through First Port's 'Launch Me' programme which is a specialist training scheme aimed at people who are starting up social enterprises and third sector organisations. Through this programme, Carraig Connections will be established with strong governance, policies, a diverse board and a number of projects that will be beneficial to all communities in Carrick.

UPCOMING PROJECTS

Kirkoswald Reading Room

Our first project is to re-develop the former



Reading Room in Kirkoswald located next door to the former 'Peggy's Tearoom'. This is hoped to become a local and visitor information centre as well as our Headquarters. Within this space there will be opportunities for exhibition and museum space, local information, research space and retail space. The venue could also be used by local groups as a meeting space and the garden space behind could be utilised for a number of purposes. There are plans for the other room in this building to become a unique entertainment and learning experience which would be the first of its kind in Carrick. Watch this space!

Maybole Castle

Discussions have begun for potential usage of Maybole Castle. This space has a few more months to go before it is ready for any community use. A business case is currently being written and there are further discussions to be had with those involved in this project.

Bruce Art Trail

Carraig Connections is looking to have community engagement events around the Bruce Art Trail Sculptures across North Carrick. This will be a series of small pop-up events that will be all about finding out more about each villages' heritage and the other stories connected to them. Local school children will be heavily involved in shaping how this will look and there will also be a project that will create a digital animation to tell these stories for visitors online.

We have a new Tourism Website for Carrick which showcases our different heritage sites and joins them together under the 'eco-museum' concept.

The Galloway & Southern Ayrshire Biosphere

Partnership has launched two new itineraries in its popular series of Low Carbon Days Out, including a Carrick and Alloway route which explores the UNESCO Biosphere's stunning West Coast. Designed to support sustainable leisure and tourism, Low Carbon Days Out are aimed at both local residents and visitors and encourage adventure by bus, bike and rail, with some lovely walks in between. Each itinerary is available as a free digital download for use on-the-go, or as a foldout leaflet which can be picked up from community hubs and visitor information points – look out for copies on display at the Carrick Centre in Maybole, and Kirkmichael's McCosh Hall. The Carrick and Alloway route includes the designated Biosphere Communities of Ballantrae and Colmonell, the castles of Dunure, Greenan and Culzean, Girvan's marine and architectural heritage, the Ayrshire Coastal Path and Snorkel Trail, and the birthplace of Robert Burns. Public transport information and cycle times are provided through QR codes and links on the Low Carbon Days Out pages on the Biosphere's website.

The Biosphere's officer team have also been busy planning Green Health Workshops for their summer calendar of events. These are available on request to communities anywhere in the UNESCO Biosphere region; each workshop introduces Green Health as an opportunity to increase individual and collective wellbeing and connects residents with nature-based outdoor activities available locally. The first Green Health Workshops are incorporating an easy-going wildlife recording session in local green space, to demonstrate that Green Health can be something as simple as a short stroll looking for birds and bugs! The Green Health Workshop sessions expand on the collaborative work already underway between a variety of organisations which have created the Green Health App for Ayrshire and Arran and which is now expanding to include Blue Health activities, those centred around the region's rivers, lochs and the coast.



The Biosphere's ongoing initiatives are open for applications all year round, and the team is particularly encouraging local businesses and events to get involved. Businesses located within the UNESCO region are eligible for the Biosphere Certification Mark scheme which brings with it national and international marketing opportunities, as well as business development support, learning and networking events. This year the GSA Biosphere Partnership is launching a new 'Business for Biodiversity' workshop and a Carbon Literacy for Business training course, both of which can boost the green credentials which are an increasingly important reference point for customers. Event organisers can get involved through the Sustainable Event Charter which has already been awarded to Girvan Folk Festival, Newton Stewart Walking Festival, The Gralloch, Knockengorroch and Spring Fling for 2025, with more still to come.

There is no charge for any of the Biosphere's accreditation schemes although donations to support the Galloway & Southern Ayrshire Biosphere Partnership (registered Scottish charity SC044137) are always welcome. The Partnership receives no funding from UNESCO and relies on the support of core funders South of Scotland Enterprise, South Ayrshire, East Ayrshire, and Dumfries & Galloway Councils, and on donations and legacies. Kirkmichael Primary Numeracy Events



Kirkmichael Primary received £4000 of funding from the Multiply fund to purchase new numeracy resources to support teaching and learning. As part of the funding, we hosted four drop-in numeracy events for families of the school to attend. Themed around Jack and the Beanstalk for our EYC-P2 children and Brazil for P3-7, we looked at how numeracy links closely with technology, textiles, outdoor learning and cooking through activities. Our technology event was supported by Amanda Pickard, digital learning officer for South Ayrshire Council, and we had lots of fun working with her using codable toys and resources from the Council Digital Lending Library. This links in closely with our efforts to achieve the Equitable Coding Award. P3-7 used the VR Headsets to explore Brazilan landmarks and designed these on Tinkercad. EYC-2 coded the Bluebots to travel the path from Jack's house to the market. We were lucky with the weather for our outdoor morning and had a lovely time using the

For our textiles focus, P3-7 created Brazilan masks, and P1-2 made new outfits for the giant and explored textures within the school by making crayon rubbings. Finally, for our final afternoon, we had a whole school cooking afternoon. EYC-P2 had a 'Giant's Tea Party'

where they used fractions to create and cut sandwiches, and used their measuring skills to bake cupcakes. P3-7 embraced Brazilian Culture and made Brigadiros (chocolate truffles) and Canjica (Brazilian rice pudding). We finished

with a showcase of our work. Thank you to the Multiply fund for supporting our purchase of new numeracy resources.
