## 2025 Impact Report

Since its founding in 2014, NCCBC has invested nearly £3 million into 9 North Carrick communities, leveraging over £43 million in economic growth. Funded by ScottishPower Renewables' Dersalloch Windfarm, NCCBC delivers a return of £8 for every £1 spent, supporting hundreds of projects that enhance infrastructure, wellbeing, and resilience.

NCCBC's mission is to make North Carrick "a better place to live, work, visit, and enjoy leisure." Maybole Regeneration Project is glad to report that three projects have commenced work on site in recent weeks, supported by Heritage Lottery Fund, Historic Environment Scotland, and Maybole Regeneration Project Fund.

The aim of the scheme, now closed to applicants, was to support property owners and tenants to repair the historic fabric of buildings on Maybole High Street and funding will help to improve grant-eligible items such as the walls, roof, and windows of the buildings.

Grant eligible works at 4 Whitehall and 55 High Street (Scissorhands) are programmed for 6-8 weeks. Works at 88-90 High Street, the former Day-Today, will take around 16-18 weeks and the owners are taking the opportunity to upgrade the internal spaces of the building at the same time, at their own cost.





A LAW FIRM FOR LIFE

#### From April 2026, Inheritance Tax (IHT) relief on business and agricultural assets will be capped at £1 million per estate which may result in many business owners and farmers' estates subject to IHT.

Previously, farming and business assets could qualify for 100% relief allowing farms and businesses to be passed down to the next generation without any tax due.

Under the new regime, assets above the £1 million threshold may attract only 50% relief - effectively subjecting them to a 20% tax rate.

Farmers and business owners will still

have their own personal inheritance tax allowances, and a married couple may have up to a £2 million allowance if advice is sought and future planning put in place.

The £1 million allowance is not transferable unlike the personal allowances which means that Wills need to be carefully drafted to ensure that an estate maximises all allowances available.

The options available to families will very much depend on their own circumstances; the ages of those involved in the business, the nature and value of the assets, current borrowing etc. Matters may be more complex than families realise as there are not just tax consequences to consider when estate planning.

We are urging clients who think they may be impacted by the changes to review their affairs well ahead of the rule changes to ensure assets are passed on as efficiently as possible either during lifetime or through a Will.

#### Obituary

#### m Jan Moore ~ 1928- 2025

#### From Beachcomber

Every spring for decades Jan Moore, who died aged 96, would pack her bags in Brisbane, hop on a plane and fly 10,000 miles to land up in Maidens. There she would spend the summer in the family cottage overlooking the harbour, the Clyde and the mountains of Arran.

This pilgrimage halfway around the globe flowed in her Ayrshire blood. She was born in the village, raised there and vowed she would always return.

And she did. Every year for decades despite raising a family in Australia.

Jan was born on 23rd
November, 1928. Her father
James Sloan was a Carrick
fisherman, her mother
Elizabeth (nee Howatson)
was a cheese maker. Jan
spent her childhood in
Shanter Road only steps away
from the cottage where she
ultimately lived in latter years.
In fact it was her parents' summer
retreat.

She trained as a teacher and worked in, among other Ayrshire schools, Maidens
Primary where she herself had been a pupil. After the war she travelled with her mother to Australia on a family trip. In Adelaide, they were driven around by the only person they knew with a car. And that was Alan Moore, an agronomy student. Three years later, he showed up in Maidens. Romance blossomed. An engagement emerged.

Alan left for the US for his doctoral studies. Jan followed and they married in 1954 in the intriguingly named town of Black Diamond, Washington. Her

innate curiosity about the world around her never flagged and with Alan's work they lived and worked in Canada, Nigeria, Holland, India and Italy. The latter held special interest for the couple as they held a mutual passion for zippy Alpha Romeo sports cars which at times were housed in Maidens after visits to Rome for Alan's work with the United

Nations.

wartime memories of her teenage years in Maidens were recounted in the authoritative book 'Turnberry Airfield' about the RAF base. Author Margaret Morrell quoted Jan as saying: 'The airbase had a huge impact on village life. ... For a teenager it was all very exciting, rather frightening and sad too'. Her stories included not only the social side of the base but also, tragically, those of the young men who died while training or in action.

In recent years, her vibrant

'The airfield changed our lives dramatically. It scattered local girls to Canada, New Zealand, and Australia. The village had changed forever.' she explained.

Jan's determined commitment to Scotland increased after Alan's retirement. Annual visits become her norm. After his death in 2004, she returned every year, many times accompanied by her son Nic. Even this year, aged 96, she was packing her bags in Brisbane ready for her next 10,000 mile trip to Maidens when she became ill and sadly died.

Her four children and five grandchildren in Australia ensured her ashes returned to Ayrshire. It was her wish. They were interred at Kirkoswald cemetery where her husband Alan and parents are buried. Jan Moore will be forever near the village of Maidens that she loved so much, enfolded among the Carrick hills she dreamed of throughout her long and eventful life.




#### KIRKMICHAEL

It's been a landmark summer for Kirkmichael. The village has taken a huge step forward with the creation of the Kirkmichael Ayrshire Development Trust and, through it, the ongoing project to purchase the historic McCosh Hall on Patna Road for the community. It is hoped that this wonderful achievement will secure the hall's future for generations to come. The hall is already at the heart of village life – home to the shop and tearoom, and buzzing with activity from local clubs and groups, including the bowling club with its thriving membership. Looking ahead, there's plenty to look forward to.

A Plaque was Unveiled on Sunday 14th September, led by the Kirkmichael History

Group with a short talk from Rev. Gerald Jones and Rob Close. The plaque marks the countdown to the hall's 150th anniversary in 2026. A little history: John McCosh, born in Kirkmichael Parish in 1805, left an extraordinary legacy. After a distinguished career as a military surgeon in India – and a sideline in poetry and early photography – he bequeathed funds that led to the opening of McCosh Hall in 1899. Ever since, the hall has stood at the centre of village life.

# Maidens Craf

Thanks to funding from VASA (Voluntary Action South Avrshire) in 2022, MCA (Maidens Community Association), were able to start an Arts and Crafts club. The funding was a one off from VASA, from their coming out of Covid fund, but it did allow the establishment of the club.

The club meets on Wednesday evenings, in the church hall. At £30 a night, it is a major cost outlay for us. So, in later years, we are extremely grateful to NCCBC (North Carrick Community Benefits Company) and KMT (Kirkoswald, Maidens, Turnberry Development Trust), for stepping in with funding for materials and payment of the church hall costs.

Without their help and continued support, it would be difficult to keep the club running. We mostly use expertise from within the group to learn different crafts, but where appropriate will bring in trainers to deliver new crafts.

Some of the topics we have tried so far are – decoupage, acrylic painting, card making, neurographic art, jewellery making, quilling, macrame and many others. We are a very sociable bunch, with over 22 in the WhatsApp group, of which there are 10 regulars. We all agree it has helped with the transition back into the community after the catastrophe of Covid.

Our aim now, is to become more self-sufficient and less reliant on the funding from our supporters, which we are of course very grateful for. We are therefore trying to build a stock of finished parts of the different crafts we have found most successful. We had a trial run with one of the local groups which was very good and has prompted us to take a table at a local Christmas fayre later this year.



#### **Bute House Fundraising**

Janice shepherd writes about raising funds at the gatherings Maybole and due to generosity of Maybole, outlying areas, Ayrshire and Kirkmichael, raised £1020 in the 3 weeks she ran the shop after all expenses was paid out.

My husband Tom Shepherd who is now in Bute House nursing home Cumnock loves living there, he originally went in for respite care so I, his wife, Janice could get a rest. After going into this home a few times when the time came for him to move in

permanently, he chose this home out of all the ones he visited as the best. Yes, he loved Dalmellington and Patna's care homes, but there was something about the people, staff and janitors he just really liked. He gets on so well with the staff who are super helpful and friendly that this became his home.

Tom has been here since he caught COVID in 2023, he developed vascular dementia, and I could no longer care for all his needs. My family and friends have been a great support to me, and I would have been lost without them. So as a group, we decided to give something back to the home that has looked after him and so many others. I set up a charity shop at The Gatherings in Maybole for two weeks, the word went out and the donations came in as can be seen in the photos. I had enough stock items to keep the shop open for more weeks than I could manage, but, as I relied on help volunteers to run the shop, two weeks was my maximum with a goal of £1000 to go towards residents' funds in the home. We in total raised £1500 after costs and we donated £1020 to the home's funds as pictured. A good friend Jan and Alan Finlay taught me how to run the shop and with the help of Patna knit and natter group, over 60s we loaded the goods into cars and set the shop up.

I cannot thank my volunteers and friends for all their help, Sandra Laidlaw is like my sister, her encouragement, cups of tea and biscuits kept us all going. My family, what can I say you were brilliant,



all this meant a great deal to myself and family in giving something back to a home who cares and loves the clients as their own.

The large cheque donated from random acts of kindness Jan and Alan Finlay finally finished off our adventure. Unsold donated goods were handed to a group in Gambia, the thistle centre, Netherthird community centre. Random acts of kindness and Kirkmichael community shop.

#### Development Manager's Update



#### **Bruce Trail Buzz**

We're working on funding applications to support a series of arts and cultural events linked to the new artworks and AR Trail. We're also making sure local shops are stocked with stickers and know how important their role is in keeping the Trail alive.

#### **Carraig Connections Taking Shape**

- Work continues to set up the new Carraig Connections Development Trust, with OSCR registration as a SCIO now complete.
- Plans for the Kirkoswald Reading Room are moving forward – once the Building Warrant is secured, the local group will seek quotes from local contractors and start fundraising.
- The Trustees of Maybole Castle have been asked to consider giving Carraig Connections a lease as a community tenant. A new Business Plan and Economic Impact Statement are strengthening funding bids and showing the Castle's potential as a huge asset for the wider economy.
- The Trust's full business plan is also underway, backed by the NCCBC's "Heritage Enterprise Village" project and with a good chance of £45,000 from Firstport's Build It programme next year.

Ideas for a large statue to celebrate Carrick's place in the story of Robert the Bruce are progressing slowly. Now led by the new Carraig Connections, we're waiting on feedback from the planning authority. Once advice comes in, Carraig Connections will decide on the next steps for this exciting project.

#### A Fresh Look at Memorial Park

Talks are ongoing with South Ayrshire Council about the future of Maybole Swimming Pool and Golf Course. The idea is to develop a Maybole Outdoor Activity Hub – but we'll need funding to bring in sports facility expertise to help make it happen.

#### **Green Light for Minishant**

Great news – NCCBC has secured £13,500 from the Ayrshire Climate Action Hub for the Minishant Development Team. This will fund a Landscape Architect and Ecologist to design the grounds around the proposed Community Ecology Centre, with results expected by the end of the year.

The Gatherings – Upstairs and Down The flat above The Gatherings is now successfully let. The Gatherings itself is available to community groups – to use as a charity shop or for exhibitions or other activities. (Contact gatherings@nccbc.org.uk for details)

#### **Updated NCCBC Funding Guidance and Application Form Aims to Make Applications Easier**

North Carrick Community Benefit Company (NCCBC) has recently updated its funding guidance and application form, aiming to make the process of applying for grants a bit easier for local groups.



The new documents are the result of feedback from community organisations who told us that the previous version could be hard to follow. We've tried to respond by making the information clearer, better structured, and more practical for the people using it. And we have moved the application process online.

#### What's Changed?

#### **Easier to Navigate**

The guidance now has a clearer layout, with headings, bullet points, and shorter sections. We hope this helps applicants find what they need more quickly without having to read through lots of dense text.

#### **Clearer Language**

We've done our best to remove jargon and overly formal language. The tone is intended to be more straightforward and supportive, especially for groups that may be new to applying for funding.

#### Better Guidance on What's Eligible

The sections on what NCCBC can and can't fund have been made more prominent and specific. This includes clearer information about exclusions and funding limits, to help applicants avoid common pitfalls.

#### **Step-by-Step Application Help**

There's now a more detailed walkthrough of the application form itself, breaking it down section by section with brief explanations. This is intended to support applicants in completing each part accurately.

#### **Match Funding Requirements Set Out Clearly**

Match Funding Requirements Set Out Clearly We've included a simple table and some examples to explain match funding - something several applicants told us was confusing in the past.

#### **More Transparency Around Conditions and Deadlines**

Conditions and Deadlines We've also clarified what kind of evidence and reporting will be required if funding is awarded, and added clearer information about application deadlines and decision-making timelines.

#### **Lower levels of Match Funding** Required

One of the most significant changes in the updated funding scheme relates to match funding. In the previous version, most applications needed to have 50% match funding.

- Grants Under £3,000: Small projects can work with their local village panel to access NCCBC's Community-led Projects Fund, with no match funding required. (Or they can fundraise via local charity shops or apply to other funders.)
- Grants between £3,000–£6,000: A reduced contribution of 20% match funding is needed.
- Grants between £6,001–£15,000: Most NCCBC applications fall into this category, and the requirement has been lowered from 50% to 30%.
- Grants between £15,001-£40,000: 50% match funding is required and NCCBC has set an upper limit on the size of grants it will provide. This is to make sure that funds can be spread across the whole area.
  - 8 Moving to Online Applications

The move to an online application form, now available through the NCCBC website, is intended to make the funding process more accessible, consistent, and manageable for everyone involved. By completing the form directly online, applicants can now work through each section in a clear, structured order. They can scroll down to the bottom of the form at any time to save it and come back later. All of this should help reduce errors, missed sections, or confusion about what information is needed, ultimately making applications stronger and easier to assess.

Submitting applications online also means everything is submitted in one place, at the same time – avoiding the risks of lost attachments or incomplete email submissions. It creates a more straight forward process for applicants and ensures that applications can be processed more efficiently by the NCCBC team. We recognise that this may be a change in approach that some groups might find difficult. We hope the clarity and structure of the online form will make the overall experience simpler and more reliable. Support and advice is always available for any groups that need help navigating the process.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

NCCBC is committed to helping local ideas take shape – whether that's a new facility, an activity or training programme, or improvements to community spaces. These updates are intended to remove some of the hurdles that applicants faced in the past and ensure more groups can benefit from the support available.





Grants of up to £1,000 are available for planting native species in South Ayrshire and East Ayrshire within the UNESCO Biosphere. The area to be planted must measure less than 0.6ha

#### **Mark Fletcher:** Celebrating a Decade of Service to Maybole and North Carrick

After years of dedicated service, Mark Fletcher is stepping down as Chair of both Maybole Community Council and North Carrick Community Benefit Company. As he prepares to move away from the area, the communities he has served so faithfully are taking the opportunity to thank him and to reflect on all that has been achieved under his leadership.

#### A Community Leader Through Change

Few individuals have given more to Maybole and North Carrick in recent years than Mark Fletcher. His name has become synonymous with community leadership: reliable, approachable, and focused on making things happen. Now, as he stands down from his official positions due to moving away from the area, residents and organisations alike are reflecting on just how much has been achieved during his time in post.

#### Securing the By-pass: A Campaign That Changed the Town

For decades, Maybole's High Street suffered from relentless A77 traffic. Heavy lorries thundered through the town every day, damaging buildings, polluting the air, and endangering pedestrians. Alongside local stalwarts David Kiltie and Peter Mason, and many other campaigners, Mark played a leading role in the effort to finally secure a Maybole By-pass. It required determination, persistence, and the ability to keep decision-makers' attention focused on Maybole's needs. The by-pass, completed in 2022, has transformed daily life in the town. The High Street is quieter, safer, and healthier. Businesses and residents can now look to the future without the constant disruption of through-traffic. For many, even though work is yet to be done on important 'public realm' parts of the project, this achievement stands as one of the most significant turning points in Maybole's modern history — and Mark's leadership was at the heart of it.

Driving Regeneration: £7.5 Million for the Town With the traffic issue resolved, Mark turned his energy

towards regeneration. As Chair of the Maybole Regeneration Project (MRP) Board, he helped secure £7.5 million of investment — a scale of funding few towns of Maybole's size ever see. The regeneration programme has delivered: - Repairs and renovations



to Maybole Town Hall, creating a community hub fit for the 21st century. - Restoration of Maybole Castle, one of Scotland's oldest castles, safeguarding it for future generations. - Proposals for Shopfront and housing improvements, raising standards and making the High Street more welcoming. - Proposals for Active travel projects, improving paths and connections for walking and cycling. Mark chaired the board throughout, keeping partners aligned and making sure local voices were heard. Whilst everyone can see that the project has not been fully realised, Mark's steady hand ensured the project kept moving and delivered visible results.

#### Saving and Repurposing the Speakers Club

When the old Speakers Club building on Whitehall fell into disrepair, Mark once again stepped up. He helped form a new charity to take ownership, secured funding, and led a major refurbishment. The building was transformed, providing modern facilities and space for community and enterprise activity. Although the initial social enterprise could not survive the shock of the Covid-19 pandemic, Mark ensured the asset was not lost. The building was handed on free of charge to another local charity, and today it thrives as the KA19 Youth Hub, offering vital services and opportunities to young people in Maybole and North Carrick. It is a shining example of Mark's philosophy: never give up, always find a way forward, and make sure the community benefits.

#### **Delivering Local Projects**

Mark's leadership of the Maybole Community Council has also delivered many other practical improvements. One standout is the new skatepark, a popular facility giving young people a safe and exciting place to be active. From supporting local events and festivals to making sure residents' concerns were represented to South Ayrshire Council and other agencies, Mark has consistently ensured that MCC was a council that got things done.

#### Strengthening the Wider North Carrick Area

Mark's contribution has not been limited to Maybole. As Chair of the North Carrick Community Benefit Company (NCCBC), he has overseen major investment across all eight towns and villages of the area.

#### Under his leadership:

- Millions of pounds of windfarm community benefit funds have been invested in local groups and facilities.
- Upgraded play parks in Maybole and the 8 North Carrick Villages, jointly funded by NCCBC and South Ayrshire Council.
- The Foundations for Recovery programme secured over £500,000 from the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund, supporting projects in tourism, health, wellbeing, and employability.
- An independent impact assessment showed just how transformative NCCBC's work has been over its first ten years, enabling dozens of projects and strengthening community capacity across North Carrick. Mark's chairmanship provided the governance, credibility, and vision that funders and partners looked for — giving confidence that local people's priorities would be respected.



#### Style of Leadership

Those who have worked with Mark often highlight the qualities that make him so effective: - Persistent but pragmatic - never letting go of key issues like the by-pass, but always willing to work constructively with officials and politicians.

- Community-first keeping the spotlight on projects, not personalities.
- Partnership-focused building bridges between local volunteers, statutory agencies, and funders.
- Future-oriented always looking at how today's efforts could secure tomorrow's opportunities.

Of course, as with anyone in a high-profile community role, Mark has had his critics and detractors. The naysayers can sometimes shout the loudest, but it is important to remember that the vast majority of residents and partner organisations have supported the work carried out under his leadership. The visible improvements to Maybole and North Carrick stand as clear evidence that his persistence and vision have made a positive and lasting difference.

**Stepping Down, Not Stepping Away** Mark's decision to step down is driven by circumstance: moving away from Maybole and North Carrick means he is no longer eligible to hold office locally. At the same time, he has been open about his ongoing battle with cancer - a challenge he faces with the same courage and determination he has brought to community work. Although he will no longer chair MCC or NCCBC, Mark's contribution does not end here. The organisations he has led are stronger and more effective because of his guidance. The by-pass, the regeneration project, the Youth Hub, the skatepark, upgraded play parks in Maybole and the 8 villages, the Foundations for Recovery programme - all these continue to deliver benefits, and all bear the imprint of his leadership.

#### A Community's Thanks

As Maybole and North Carrick look back on the past decade, it is impossible not to see Mark Fletcher's

influence everywhere. He has been at the centre of campaigns, projects, and partnerships that have changed the face of the area. From safer streets to restored heritage, from youth facilities to resilient communities, his service has touched every corner of North Carrick.



On behalf of the whole community: thank you, Mark. Your leadership has made a difference. Your persistence has delivered results. Your care for the people of Maybole and North Carrick has been unwavering. And while you step down from formal roles, your example will continue to inspire those who follow.

'When Mark came to stay in Maybole over 20 years ago he was keen to find out what was happening in the town. A chance meeting with David and Peter after a Community Council meeting in a local pub gave Mark the opportunity to find out more by coming along to the next meeting. Over the years Mark became chair of the Community Council and throughout his time was involved in many projects which made Maybole a better place. 
#### Wellbeing and support for all ages

Kirkmichael Primary proudly announces its achievement of the Equitable Creative Coding Award (ECCo), recognising innovative and inclusive approaches to computational thinking and coding from early childhood to secondary level. As part of the Digital Schools Awards Scotland initiative, ECCo celebrates work in ELCs and schools to integrate coding into the curriculum and aligns with the principles of the Curriculum for Excellence. Andrew Hislop, Head Teacher at Kirkmichael said: "The Equitable Creative Coding Award (ECCo) holds significant importance for our school and reaffirms our school's commitment to fostering problem-solving, critical thinking, key meta skills and digital literacy skills in our students.

By embedding these skills into our curriculum and extracurricular activities, we aim to empower students to explore, create, and innovate in an increasingly digital world. "At Kirkmichael, we have implemented a variety of engaging activities and initiatives to support our students in developing coding and computational thinking skills. We are immensely grateful for the support from the local authority's digital learning officers and the resources within the Digital Lending Library.

We have had in class support from Amanda Pickard, leading learning with all pupils across P1-7 using Micro:Bits, and the excitement and enthusiasm from children has been incredible. The children enjoy using digital toys such as Bluebots and Indi cars to support their learning across the curriculum and are enjoying investigating how digital resources work. I am proud of the learning opportunities the young people here are participating in, the efforts of all staff across the school

to instigate it, and I am pleased it has been recognised at a national level. Our validator said that Kirkmichael EYC was one of the best EYCs she has validated.' Kirkmichael Primary and EYC now collectively hold all 7 digital schools award and gained all within 12 months which is a fantastic achievement.

#### Growing, Cooking and Munching – A Community Collaboration

Kirkmichael Primary previously told the NCCBC magazine about the continuing development of the polytunnel and the support of the Kirkmichael Gardening Club and community to get this up and running. In May, the children were able to see the efforts of their hard work as produce was able to be harvested. After a fantastic beetroot harvest, Emma White taught the children how to prepare and pickle beetroot, and all families got a jar to take home. Additionally, the children harvested potatoes, lettuce, cucumbers, a variety of herbs, onions, spring onions, peas and rhubarb before the summer, which was collected by the Kirkmichael Arms.

Justin had previously worked with P3-7 to develop a menu using these ingredients, and on Thursday 27th June, all families were able to go to the Kirkmichael Arms for a 3-course meal using the locally grown produce. The menu included a roasted beetroot humous with bread, a vegetable risotto and finally a lemon posset with meringue and fresh fruit. Kirkmichael Primary are excited to see what happens next in year 2 of the polytunnel, and we are looking forward to future collaborations with the gardening club and the Kirkmichael Arms.

On Wednesday 25th June, Kirkmichael Primary and EYC held their end of year service. This celebrated the successes of pupils throughout the year, allowed our EYC children to graduate into Primary 1 and we said farewell to our Primary 7 children leaving for Carrick Academy.

Crosshill Primary and Minishant Primary.
We are sorry to see her go, but we know


